A set of four eighteenth century French tapestries owned by Mr. R. Foster Reynolds of Providence, have been loaned to Brown University and will be placed on exhibition at the Faunce House Gallery, from February 25th to March 26th. The largest of these tapestries, a fabric measuring about twelve by fifteen feet, is one of a set of twelve that hung in Blenheim Castle, and represents the Duke of Marlborough returning with his army, presumably from the victorious campaign on the Continent, that was carried on during the years from 1704 to 1709. Interest in the composition centers on the procession of nobles in the near foreground, mounted on their chargers and led by heralds, blowing their trumpets. An effect of very deep space is achieved through showing a broad plain beyond these near figures, with row upon row of mounted cavalry receding into the

in the late seventeenth and early eighteenth centuries, and his interest in animal painting led to the use of a different type of subject matter. The "Fables of La Fontaine" executed by Oudry on chair covers attained immediate popularity and brought the Beauvais Factory out of a very serious depression into a considerable period of prosperity. The two pieces at Faunce House, one entitled "The Swing" and the other, "Pastoral," both have the figures of animals incorporated into the design, suggesting the influence of Oudry, while the delicacy of treatment in the carefree figures at play or at rest, the design and coloring of drapery folds and floral forms, are reminiscent of Boucher. It is known that the designs of the latter went beyond the Gobelin factory and were woven on the Beauvais Loom. Tapestry making at this period abandoned the practice of weaving from cartoons and became a process of faithfully copying finished paintings. While this practice made possible the attainment of tone and color relationships of a delicacy never before reached, it marked the entry of the art into the realm of painting, and the transition of the weaver as an artist improvising the color and form from drawings, in the flat, sharp decorative quality that is characteristic of the earlier periods, to an exact copyist, faithfully reproducing the infinite subtleties of oil painting.

Of the medium sized tapestry, entitled "The Roman Senators," it is not certain on what loom it was produced but it has been suggested that it may be from the Beauvais factory. Certainly it is of a very different character than the two known Beauvais items in the exhibition, indicating that if it came from that loom it was executed

distance. Overhead are cloud patterns and tree foliage, the latter bringing a striking blend of green and tan notes, and an interesting form pattern in contrast to the figures below. The border of this tapestry, starting from a coat of arms mounted over a pair of cannon and draped banners at the top, extends around in an interlocked pattern of an odd assortment of the trappings of war, from weapons, armor and harness, to tent poles, pots and pans and wine kegs. It is an impressive piece of work, beautifully designed and well preserved, with the colors considerably mellowed through the years.

Of the three other tapestries, the two smaller hangings are known to be from the Beauvais Loom, and were probably executed under the directorship of Jean Baptiste Oudry, and possibly under the influence of the French painter Boucher. Oudry was director of the loom

under an earlier director, probably Behagle, who directly preceded Oudry. Historical data on the nature of the designs woven under that Flemish director show that they were of rather a ponderous nature with frequent use of heavy architectural forms and masses of drapery. The tapestry of "The Roman Senators" is the only one of the group designed with an indoor setting. A tightly composed group of Senators, with two soldiers, appears in the right foreground in the lofty corridor of a massive stone building. To the left the corridor thrusts deeply into the background, with however a strong counter movement in the figures of several Senators moving out of doorways on the left. The border is of a conventional leaf pattern with angels in the corners and a coat of arms supported by two cherubs at the top.
